

From our Rabbi, Michael Arsers

We beginning say at the of shacharit every morning, "These are the precepts whose fruits a person enjoys in this world but whose principal remains intact for him in the World to Come. They are: the honor due to father and mother, acts of kindness, early attendance at the house of study mornings and evenings, hospitality to guests, visiting the sick, providing for a bride, escorting the dead, absorption in prayer, bringing peace between man and his fellow – and the study of Torah is equivalent to them all." This is a very impressive list of the most important *mitzvot*, but we see that study has a very special place in Judaism.

Let us be clear, Torah does not refer only to the Five Books of Moses. Torah includes the entire Jewish tradition. Of course, engaging in the close study of the primary texts of the Jewish tradition is of paramount importance. We have been pursuing this precept in our monthly series Let's Study Talmud which we have conducted on ZOOM. Our sessions have allowed us to gain an appreciation for the variety of approaches to the observance of Jewish holidays and how what we do is rooted in the Talmudic discussions. The *derashas* that I write every week are also part of our study of Torah. In each one, I attempt to explore an aspect of the weekly portion in order to explain its deeper meaning or to see how it fits into a broader understanding of Judaism.

Studying Jewish history and Jewish literature of later periods, including contemporary Jewish life, is also important and should be taken seriously. There are, of course, many resources today for engaging in such study. I would like to recommend one resource that I consider to be of very high quality. The tikvahfund.org hosts a web site that is worth your time exploring. There are podcasts, articles, and online courses on a wide range of topics. Currently, the featured courses include "Deuteronomy, the Last Speech of Moses," with Micah Goodman. The course description states, "The ideas of the Book of Deuteronomy changed the world. One of Israel's leading intellectuals delves into the theological and political lessons

of Moses's final speech." There is a course that explores in depth the Israeli Declaration of Independence. There are two courses taught by Ruth Wisse, professor of Yiddish Literature at Harvard University. Rabbi Meir Soloveichik teaches "Jewish Ideas and the American Founders." He holds a Ph.D from Princeton University and is rabbi of Congregation Shearith Israel, the oldest congregation in the United States. He also is the director of the center for Torah and Western Thought at Yeshiva University.

There are many other courses. Some are free, some are not. I only mention a few to whet your appetite. But, if we are looking for an online source for serious Jewish scholarship of the highest caliber, this web site is fantastic.


